According to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), using expired medicines is risky and possibly harmful to your health. Expiration dates have been used on the counter and over prescription medicines since the 1970's and are important in determining if the product is safe or if it will work as intended. Expired products can be less effective or risky due to a in chemical change composition or a decrease in potency that can occur over time. Improper storage, such as a humid bathroom cabinet, can speed this decomposition. This is why medicines should be stored in а non-humid and controlled temperature area. Expired medications should used. be Expired, not unused unwanted or medicines should be disposed of properly. The preferred method of disposal is to drop the

medicine off at a Drug Take Back Program. If a facility is not available to you, the FDA recommends flushing some medications down the toilet or sink because they can be harmful to children and pets.
